
Background


- July 2017
 - Children's Commission launched Statewide Collaborative on Trauma-Informed Care (SCTIC)
 - MMHPI released a Final Report on Trauma-Informed Care
- Four Workgroups aligned with overarching goals met 25+ times over an 18 month period
- Steering Committee comprised of Workgroup Chairs and DFPS and Commission staff reviewed and finalized all proposed strategies

Purpose of the Blueprint

- Develop a roadmap to become a trauma-informed child welfare system
- Provide structure for implementation
- Invite innovation and improvement in both public and private sectors

Youth & Family Voice (2)






A trauma-informed child welfare system includes and respects youth and family voice and cultivates resilience.

A trauma-informed child welfare system has information sharing capabilities that are accessible, manageable, innovative, and user-friendly.





A trauma-informed child welfare system is informed by data and committed to continuous quality improvement.
